We were thrilled to host our Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony for the completion of our 5-unit property in Normal Heights. Our Miracle on 34th Street project is now home to deserving young mothers and children who are survivors of domestic violence. Case management and wraparound support services will ensure these families can escape the cycles of homelessness, poverty, abuse and neglect. Additionally, an amazing local family made a lead gift that allowed us to purchase our 5th multi-unit property for homeless youth and families.

This past year, we added a Transportation/Visitation program for families engaged with Child Welfare Services in need of evidence-based supervision, added a Vicarious Trauma for Caregivers Support Group, and expanded our housing services to meet this urgent community need.

In this year's Annual Report, you'll be touched by inspiring success stories that have been made possible through the support of caring partners like you. Accompanying statistics on the program accomplishments you helped us achieve demonstrate the measurable impact you and Home Start are making daily. Together, we are building stronger communities each day across San Diego County.

Visit our website, like us on Facebook and follow us on LinkedIn and Instagram for the most current news and events. **ANNA** enrolled in Home Start's Community Services for Families program in 2020 as a single teen mom. For two years, her Family Support Partner Maria guided her along the journey of escaping domestic violence and equipping her for success. Early on in the program, Anna was fleeing a domestic violence relationship with the teenage father of her toddler Jamie. Unfortunately, Anna was familiar with domestic violence from her own childhood. She shared with Maria a vivid memory of hosing her own mother down with water when she was six years old after her father poured gasoline on her and threatened to light her on fire.

Over the next 10 years, Anna was homeless and eventually found herself in a physically, emotionally, sexually, and financially abusive relationship. She eventually sought help after her child began to have night terrors and would hit her. Anna believed Jamie's aggression was due to her witnessing similar abuse committed against her by her father.

Under Maria's support and guidance, Anna completed in-home parenting services curriculum. She followed through with obtaining a restraining order against her abuser, permanently moved in with her mother, and has enrolled Jamie into behavioral health services for therapy. Anna is proud of herself for completing these parenting services because it is the only thing she feels she has ever accomplished and knows her daughter is worth it. Anna is now working a full-time job and is feeling that the future is much brighter for herself and Jamie.

COMMUNITY SERVICES FOR FAMILIES (CSF)

This program provides a comprehensive educational and supportive approach to help children maintain their placements in safe, nurturing, and stable homes.

- Community and home-based parenting education classes
- Parent Partners a peer support program
- Family Support Clinician services

FAMILIES VISITATION PROGRAM (FVP)

This program provides visitation services to parents that are Child Welfare involved working to reunify with their child.

- Family Visit Coaching
- Supervised Visitation
- Transportation Services

CSF and FVP services are free of charge and are offered in several regions of the County by Home Start.

TINA started working with Home Start's Community Services for Families In-home Parenting Program after the father of her sons filed a neglect complaint to Child Welfare Services. The boys' father did not like that Tina did not want to be with him and began retaliating by filing multiple complaints.

Tina struggled with understanding that there are some things she cannot control and finally came to understand her situation was a form of domestic abuse. Even though she works full-time and is a single mother, Tina comes prepared to every appointment with questions to learn more about positive parenting. Tina says, "My Family Support Partner is the best. She is extremely responsive and is always there when I need her. Her help during the holiday season allowed my boys to have an amazing Christmas."

Domestic violence survivor VAL was referred to Home Start from a partner agency in January of 2023. She was recently granted a restraining order against the father of her three children who are 12, 10 and 9 years old. After the domestic violence incidents, her abuser was required to move out, leaving Val as the head of household.

Since the abusive partner paid most of the bills, Val was left with a huge responsibility. She struggled with her mental health and the stressors that came with her domestic violence situation. Thanks to the partnership with the referring agency, Home Start was able to help her with January's rent. In addition to this, Home Start helped her family with February's rent and half of the March rent as well. Val has been able to work on becoming self-sufficient and providing a safe home for her children while they figure out their next steps.

JUAQUIN is a 22-year-old male struggling to get into a more permanent housing situation. When his Home Start Case Manager first met him, he was couch surfing and staying on the streets. After completing a transitional program and moving to a room temporarily, he was ready to find his own place. Juaquin has been approved for section 8 and, thanks to Home Start's financial assistance, was able to move in and is now stably housed. **MIA** came to the program in early March with her two young children. Mia grew up in the foster care system and eventually aged out of her last program at 21. Since then, she had been living with friends until a mold finding in the space she lived in resulted in her being forced to leave. With no stable income and two young boys, Mia desperately needed housing.

Mia turned to Home Start, and we housed Mia and her children immediately without her having to spend any time on the streets. Our staff has worked alongside her this past month, and she has already started a full-time job, enrolled her children in childcare, received gift cards for groceries, and — most importantly — has a safe place for her and her children to lay their heads at night.

MATERNITY HOUSING PROGRAM (MHP)

The Maternity Housing Program (MHP) provides pregnant or parenting women facing homelessness ages 18-24 and their children with mid- to long-term housing and wrap-around supportive services.

MHP offers these mothers a safe, stable home and educational programs to provide them the tools to become self-sufficient and develop healthy relationships with their children. Home Start's MHP also offers these young mothers:

- Evidence-based parenting education
- Job-readiness training
- Behavioral health services
- Financial literacy
- Higher education support

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES

> TREATMENT FOR CHILDREN PARENT-CHILD INTERACTION THERAPY (PCIT)

PCIT is an evidence-based best practice supported by more than 30 years of research. Through an earpiece, specially trained therapists coach parents/ caregivers as they interact with their child. Parents/ caregivers learn relationship-enhancing skills and parenting techniques for improving their child's behavior.

TRAUMA-FOCUSED COGNITIVE BEHAVIORAL THERAPY (TF-CBT)

An evidence-based treatment for youth affected by trauma and their caregivers or parents.

With sensitivity to the needs of each individual and family we serve, our professional counselors offer therapeutic services to promote healing, personal growth, healthy interpersonal relationships, and positive life transitions.



TODD is a one-and-a-half-year-old who was referred by Rady's Developmental Screening and Enhancement Program to Home Start for Parent-Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT). Todd lives with aunt and has been since birth. Todd's aunt noticed that he was displaying dysregulation of emotions – he would intentionally bang his head, bite himself, ignore or disobey simple commands, and throw tantrums lasting up to 40+ minutes. Todd's Home Start therapist met with Todd and his aunt to assess the situation and see how Todd and his aunt interacted. The aunt utilized a lot of questions to engage with the client and commands. The new skill sets include labeled praises, reflections, behavioral descriptions, and emotional labeling.

Todd's therapist worked with his aunt to teach and coach her with the toddler present. After just four sessions, Todd's aunt reported improvement in his behavior and emotional regulation. Over the next few sessions, Todd's therapist focused on how his aunt could convey simple commands while using the Tell-Show-Try-Again approach.

Todd's aunt has reported that since implementing the use of simple commands, his behaviors have improved, and Todd is thriving at home and at daycare too.





FIRST 5 FIRST STEPS

First 5 San Diego promotes the health and well-being of young children during their most critical years of development, from the prenatal stage through five years of age. As part of our mission to strengthen families in order to protect children, Home Start Inc. partners with First 5 San Diego to offer the First 5 First Steps Family Support Program in East County.

Ways in which our Family Support Specialists partner with parents:

- Nurture the development of healthy relationships between parent and child
- Enhance parent knowledge about the growth and development of their child
- Support positive parenting practices
- Provide community referrals
- Support mindfulness and stress reduction practices

FADIA and her husband Amari are Iraqi refugees who fled their country after Amari's life was threatened. Both parents also experienced war trauma and decided to search for a better and safer life for their family.

> The family resettled in the U.S. to have freedom and a future for their children. Fadia was pregnant for the first time when she heard about Home Start's First 5 First Steps program from her friend. Both parents have actively engaged in the First Steps program for over a year.

As a first-time mother, Fadia is incredibly grateful to be learning about crucial child development milestones and parenting skills. She has set a goal of attending educational school first to learn English and later to get a degree. Amari works part-time, aiming to get a degree and find a better job.

MARIA came to Home Start during the pandemic because her family got sick with Covid-19. Due to the pandemic, she lost her job, and her husband's work hours got reduced. She was struggling financially due to insufficient money for food or transportation. Through Home Start Communities in Action Program, Maria received food, personal hygiene products, and transportation support to help stabilize her financial situation.

Maria's children received backpacks for the start of the school year through Home Start's Annual Backpack Drive and participated in the annual Toy Drive event. She was grateful to be able to receive gifts for her children, especially after the tough couple of years they had experienced.

More recently, Maria has participated in Home Start's Financial Literacy Services. She received assistance in advertising her entrepreneurial skills. By the end of her participation in the program, Maria's financial situation had improved. She was enrolled in Home Start's Match Savings program, where she could build her emergency fund.

As a successful client in many Home Start programs, Maria was invited to the Resident Leadership Academy Program (RLA), where she learned to become a leader in the community. She is currently volunteering on a project at an elementary school to bring health and wellness information to the parents and children through the RLA program.

CALFRESH PROGRAM

Our CalFresh program provides benefits enrollment assistance for individuals & families to access healthy, nutritious food.



COMMUNITIES IN ACTION (CinA)



Offering a hand-up through a continuum of care, this program helps move individuals and families towards self-sufficiency. Working from a strength-based perspective, each client is treated as a partner in the creation of individualized service plans designed to help them achieve self-sufficiency.

- Referrals to community resources and benefits applications assistance
- Stabilization Support (such as clothing, emergency food, emergency utility assistance and hygiene packs) to those experiencing a crisis
